

# *Historic Colton House at Coyote Range*

## *Architecture and Restoration*

**The Historic Colton House** is the original home of Dr. Harold S. Colton and Mary-Russell Ferrell Colton, cofounders of the Museum of Northern Arizona. Built in 1929, it is a 6,000-square-foot Spanish colonial revival-style rock lodge constructed by Hopi craftsmen using local materials, malpais rock, Ponderosa pine, and Douglas fir. It was named to the National Register of Historic Places as an outstanding example of regional architecture featuring clay tiles, incised beams, beehive fireplaces, and wrought iron detailing.

A restoration of the Colton House was completed in 1996. The historic integrity of the home was preserved while structural features were upgraded, making it a first-class retreat facility equipped to meet today's business needs. Set in the forest among tall pines, the relaxed, comfortable home's focal point is the great room, with an immense stone fireplace, beamed ceiling and large picture window framing an awe-inspiring view of the San Francisco Peaks.

### *The Historic Colton House*

The exquisitely appointed Colton House is perfect for small group retreats, conferences, weddings, and intimate family reunions. The expansive complex includes two meeting rooms, three bedrooms at the Colton House, two bedrooms at the Annex, and a one bedroom apartment. The Colton House can be booked separately or in tandem with the Museum's Branigar/Chase Discovery Center.

### *Branigar/Chase Discovery Center*

This flexible facility is available for small conferences, banquets, and special occasions.. The adjacent outdoor courtyard adds an informal appeal. Setup options include reception style, school room capacity for 64, stadium seating for 140, and table rounds for 175.
